General Rules:

- Abbreviations: omit corporate abbreviations in publishing company titles.
- Dates: Use the format year, month day, 2016, Mar.3.
- Missing Date: If there is not a publishing or last updated date listed, replace with **n.d.**
- Titles: Only capitalize the first word of the title and the first word of the subtitle.
 - o Example: <u>Scientists</u>: <u>Their lives and works</u>
- Author: If an author or editor is not listed, move the chapter or article title to the front of the citation entry..
- Always check with your teacher for specific question about project guidelines.

A "Reference" page is the name that APA gives to a bibliography. It is a listing of all the sources you cited in the body of your paper or project.

Items to Remember:

- The "Reference" page is always the last page of your essay or found at the end of your project.
- The title "Reference" should be centered on the last page.
- Each source entry must be complete and accurate.
- Each source entry reads like one long sentence.
- The first line of a source entry is aligned to the left. All other lines are indented 5 spaces, known as a hanging indent.
- The source entries are listed alphabetically by the first word of the source entry.
